- The second group were a homogenous group with many from the Sechelt Club. This group did not just ignite the spark but started a bush fire on a women's housing initiative.
- The economic impact is that Women would prepare food for Rotarian and other community meetings and events. Skills development was a fundamental tenant in a safe environment.
- The third group looked to partnering with a local indigenous community to solve a community water problem.
- The fourth group brought innovative thinking forward regarding farming and harvest boxes. They would also be involved in training and developing knowledge and skills.

- Other groups explored bicycle repair, recycling, international maternal and child health through vaccination programs, fundraising for the Ukraine, breakfast, and literacy programs and much, much more.
- The gift was what a 25-minute huddle can do to spark the imagination and ignite transformational thinking in Rotarians.
